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### MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR

## Lucy Van Wagner

Lucy recalls one of her most cherished trips with friends when they traveled to the Hague in Holland and from there to Brugge in Belgium. While in Brugge her friend noticed that they were close to the French border. France was not on the itinerary, but she said "let's go across\_ then I can say I've been to France and I will have added one more country to my list." They traveled not too far when they saw many people going towards the Atlantic ocean. When they saw the Dunkirk signs they became curious and followed in the direction of a small harbor. Lucy and her friends soon found out that there is a commemoration every five years. The French and the British marshaled every boat they could find for this event from World War II in May to June 1940. At this point Lucy still becomes emotional as she relates the story to me. "Being at a historical site where so many lives were lost." Reliving the drama and listening to Lucy touched me very deeply as well. She said, "I heard mostly French so that we couldn't ask questions, then I heard someone speak British English and followed the voice and saw an older gentleman with a beard. He explained many things to us and asked, 'would you like to meet Captain Bobby? He's 92 and asleep in the boat but he would love to talk to three American ladies.'" Lucy says, "To actually meet someone who was there was an incredible phenomenon. And of course we had our picture taken with this man on his boat that he used to evacuate soldiers." Over 558,000 soldiers were rescued during this time. The British Expeditionary Force and other Allied troops, cut off by the Germans, were evacuated from Dunkirk to England by an assortment of naval vessels and hundreds of civilian boats. This event has become a huge myth in England. Their government managed to turn a complete defeat into an act of utter heroism and British tenacity.

Lucy Van Wagner had an unusual childhood. Her mother died when she was 20 months old and her father remarried when she was 4 years

old. When she married, she and her husband went to Iceland for 6 months and later to Germany with their 11 month old baby while she was pregnant with their 2nd child. This was the coldest winter recorded in Germany. A highlight was a trip in their German station wagon to the warm places of northern Italy and the Adriatic Sea. Lucy is now retired. She sold her house and bought in the Lafayette two years ago. Sometimes we see Lucy walking with a tiny little girl who has her own suitcase on wheels, who stays with grandma at least once a week. Lucy has taken on a whole new adventurous life since she retired. Last summer she traveled to China with her grandsons: Jason 24, Ryan 18, and Scott aged 12. Together they climbed the great wall. They visited the 3 large excavation sites of the terra cotta warriors. These are life size figures and there are 1000's of them. Lucy's photographs are just incredible. The Emperor's Mausoleum is 16,000 square feet, and dates back to 200 B.C., the Qin dynasty. In some remote places in China, her youngest grandson got a lot of attention. He would say, "why are they staring at me?" It was the blond hair, they never saw that color before. Some even asked to have their picture taken with Scott.
